#### Advent

Why do we do this? What does it mean?

During the Advent season we prepare for the One who has come, whom we expect to come, and who will come again. We prepare our hearts and make room for the Messiah. In the hanging of the greens we share with Christians throughout the ages the memory and anticipation of Christ's coming. We decorate our church with the symbols of love, joy, hope, and peace. Why do we do this? To tell the story again and then proclaim: Jesus is born. God is with us!

## Lighting the Advent and Window Candles

This simple circle of evergreen branches testifies of the continuation of life and of life without end. The four candles represent the four weeks in Advent and encircle the Christ candle which signifies Jesus as the light of the world. The candles of the Advent wreath are significant not only in the light they share, but in their color. The three purple candles symbolize the coming of Christ from the royal line of David, through his

earthly father, Joseph, and in contemporary days, we use the purple candles to signify hope, love and peace. The single pink candle symbolizes joy and is lit on the third Sunday of Advent. The growing light of these candles stresses the growing power of Christ Jesus over darkness. We lit the hope candle last Sunday and the love candle this morning, and we will light those two again tonight. We will continue to light one candle each week, culminating with Christmas Eve services when we light the center Christ candle.

As we move through Advent, expectantly waiting, we see the Light that shines in the darkness. The light that shines reveals the hurt and pain and needs of the world, places where we can help with small acts of kindness and love.

L: We light the candles

P: remembering the light that shines in the darkness so that the darkness could not overcome it.

## Hanging the Wreaths

Evergreens have long been considered a symbol of eternity, like God's everlasting nature. Ancient people viewed evergreen with awe and wonder because of its changeless characteristic. Isaiah 60:13 tells us: "The glory of Lebanon shall come unto thee, the fir tree, the pine tree, and the box together, to beautify the place of my sanctuary; and I will glorify where my feet rest." Christmas greens point to deep, rich meanings of the season: laurel and bay symbolize victory and triumph; yew and cypress stand for eternal life; mistletoe symbolizes peace; and the prickly leaves of holly are symbols of the crown of thorns. The circle shape of the wreaths are a Christian symbol of the eternal God and eternal love, without beginning or end.

L: We hang the wreaths

P: remembering God's everlasting love for us that we share with one another.

### Placing the Flowers

The poinsettia, or "Flower of the Holy Night" as the plant is referred to in Mexico, is the most popular Advent flower. It was discovered growing wild in Mexico and was taken to North America where it was developed into the type of flower seen here today. The star-shaped center of the bloom reminds us of the star that shone on that first Christmas.

L: We place the poinsettias

P: remembering that God fulfills God's promises.
